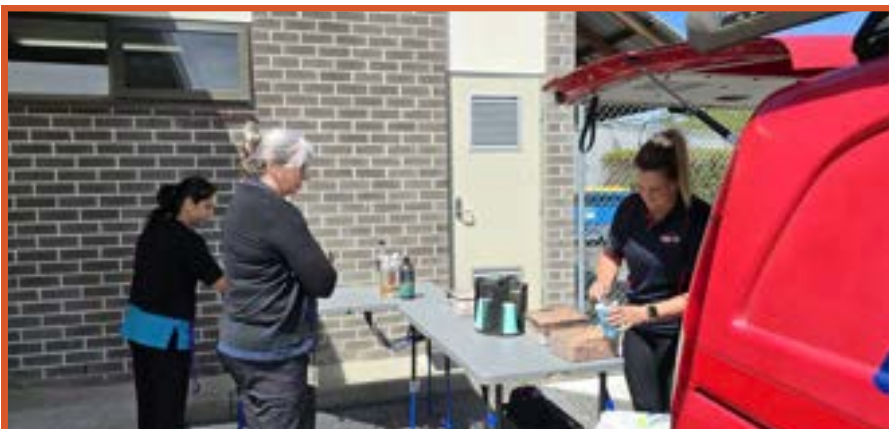
Celebrating World Kindness Day

A big thank you to our incredible staff. Your kindness and dedication make KRHS a special place for all!

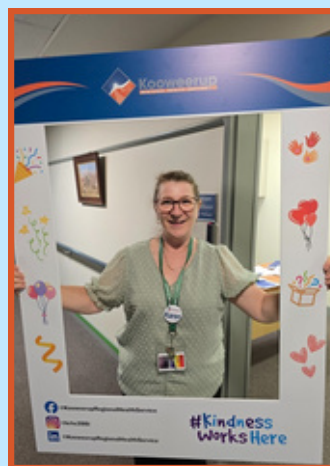

It was a wonderful opportunity to connect and share our work, and we look forward to 2026 and the new opportunities that being part of Bayside Health will bring for our community.

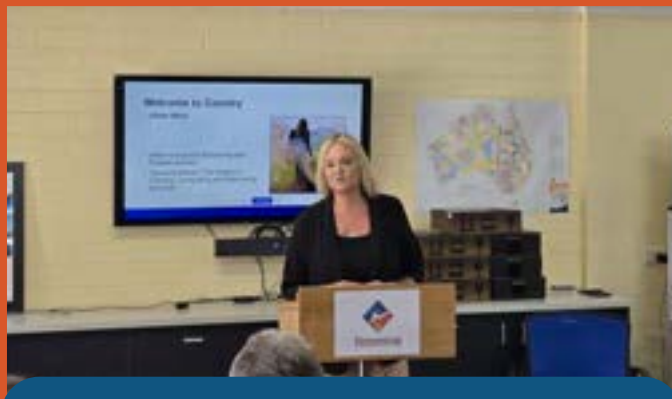

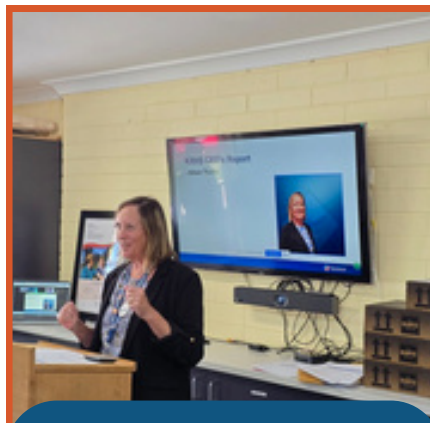

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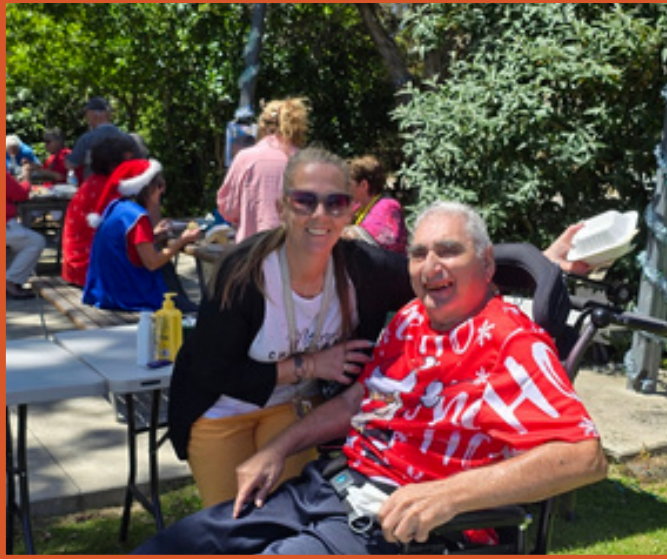

Bayside Health is ready for 2026

As 2025 draws to a close, we are excited to share that Bayside Health will begin caring for more than 1.2 million people across Melbourne and Victoria's south from 1 January 2026.

The creation of Bayside Health is one of the most significant developments in Victoria's public health sector in the past decade.

It brings together five respected health services — Alfred Health, Bass Coast Health, Gippsland Southern Health Service, Kooweerup Regional Health Service, and Peninsula Health — to deliver seamless, high-quality care across our region, from Koo Wee Rup and surrounding communities to metropolitan Melbourne, Frankston and the Mornington Peninsula, and through to Phillip Island, Bass Coast, and South Gippsland.

Strong governance and local care groups

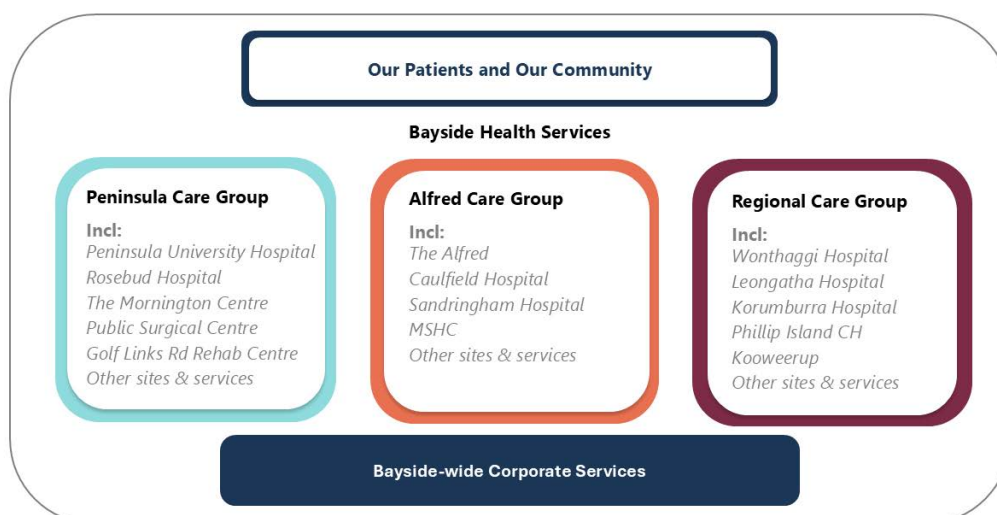
The new Bayside Health Board, announced by the Minister for Health in October, includes strong regional and First Nations representation.

In November, we welcomed Adjunct Professor Adam Horsburgh as Chief Executive to lead Bayside Health through its formative years.

Healthcare is local and personal. To maintain strong community connections, three local Care Groups — Alfred, Peninsula, and Regional — have been established, each led by a Care Group CEO. This structure supports local leadership, clinical expertise, and continuity of care for staff and patients.
